

BBC MUSIC MAGAZINE ANNOUNCES THE NOMINATED RECORDINGS FOR THE 2014 AWARDS

Voting open at www.classical-music.com/awards

from Friday 17 January - 28 February 2014

Voting for the ninth annual BBC Music Magazine Awards, the only classical music awards in which the main categories are voted for by the public, will open on Friday 17 January on the BBC Music Magazine website. This year's shortlist represents the very best of more than 1,300 recordings reviewed by BBC Music Magazine, the world's best-selling classical music monthly, in 2013, and features leading names from the international classical music world.

BBC Music Magazine's editor Oliver Condy says: "From ravishing Wagner to captivating Britten, this year's nominations are as fascinating and enticing as ever – and the artistry is as exceptional as it's ever been."

This year the new category of Concerto has been introduced in response to the volume of high quality performances. Three outstanding female instrumentalists rose to the top this year: Isabelle Faust with Bartók's Violin Concertos, Alisa Weilerstein with Elgar's Cello Concerto and violist Tabea Zimmermann playing Hindemith.

Composer anniversaries made their mark, with Benjamin Britten represented in three recordings, his *War Requiem*, plus the operas *The Rape of Lucretia* and *Peter Grimes* from the 'Grimes on Beach' project at the Aldeburgh Festival. The Vocal category was dominated by men, with Christopher Purves singing Handel, tenor Jonas Kaufmann performing Wagner and Matthias Goerne shedding new light on 20th-century Austrian composer Hanns Eisler.

The Choral category featured only 20th- and 21st-century works, including two exciting premiere recordings by Petrassi and Arvo Pärt. Exquisite performances of Baroque music on period instruments included Rachel Podger's *Guardian Angel* disc, Bach's English Suites performed by Richard Egarr and Couperin's Suites for viola da gamba by Paolo Pandolfo.

A surprise hit in the Orchestral category was the Sao Paolo Symphony's performance of Richard Strauss's *Alpine* Symphony under Frank Shipway which will go head-to-head with Edward Gardner's Szymanowski disc with the BBC Symphony Orchestra and Riccardo Chailly's Brahms Symphony cycle with the Gewandhaus Orchestra.

Recordings in seven categories including Orchestral, Concerto, Opera, Choral and Instrumental, will be presented for public voting, which will run from 17 January to 28 February on the *BBC Music Magazine* website, www.classical-music.com/awards. Audio excerpts from each of the recordings will be available on the site to help voters choose their favourites, and all voters will be entered into a draw to win a Cambridge Audio hi-fi worth £900, a Cambridge Audio Minx Air 200 speaker worth £430, plus a copy of each of the nominated recordings.

The winners of the BBC Music Magazine Awards will be announced at an exclusive awards ceremony held on 8 April 2014 at Kings Place, London. In addition to the voted awards, there are four Jury Awards: Recording of the Year, Premiere Recording, Best Newcomer and Best DVD. This year's jury was made up of a quartet of leading music critics, with Andrew McGregor, presenter of *CD Review* on BBC Radio 3, *BBC Music Magazine* editor Oliver Condy, consultant editor Helen Wallace and reviews editor Rebecca Franks.

ORCHESTRAL NOMINEES

Leipzig Gewandhaus/Riccardo Chailly

Brahms: Symphonies 1-4 etc. (Decca)

'Chailly combines fiery athleticism with the warmly blended tonalities of the wonderful Leipzig orchestra. The results tingle with immediacy and a pulsating sense of momentum'

BBC Symphony Orchestra/Edward Gardner

Szymanowski Symphonies (Chandos)

'Edward Gardner shows again that he has become one of the finest interpreters of Szymanowksi – right across the composer's distinct stylistic periods.'

Sao Paolo Symphony Orchestra/Frank Shipway

Strauss: Alpine Symphony (BIS)

'A blistering, no-holds-barred account of Strauss's musical mountain-climb... celebrating the red-hot playing of the rapidly emerging Brazilian orchestra, and, not least, Frank Shipway – an unsung hero of British conducting.'

INSTRUMENTAL NOMINEES

Richard Egarr (harpsichord)

Bach: English Suites (Harmonia Mundi)

'Egarr coaxes remarkable, expressive sounds from the harpsichord. The dances are exemplary from the "demon" gigue to a languid, spontaneous-sounding Sarabande.'

Rachel Podger (violin)

Guardian Angel: works by Bach, Biber, Tartini, Pisendel (Channel Classics)

'Surrender yourself to the ingenuity of Bach, Pisendel, Biber and Tartini in the hands of someone who speaks their language as effortlessly and fluently as you could wish.'

Arcadi Volodos (piano)

Mompou: piano works (Sony)

'With his velvet piano sound, consummate musicianship and visionary belief in Mompou's neglected piano music, Volodos has made one of 2013's most unforgettable discs. Beautifully recorded, each piece on this impeccable programme is a highlight.'

CONCERTO NOMINEES

Isabelle Faust (violin) Swedish Radio Philharmonic/Daniel Harding

Bartók: Violin Concertos No. 1&2 (Harmonia Mundi)

'Faust's affinity with Bartók has never been in doubt, and this only affirms it further. Together with Daniel Harding, she is equally compelling in moments of fragile intensity and rampaging volatility: this recording stands proudly in her distinguished discography.'

Alisa Weilerstein (cello) Staatskappelle/Daniel Barenboim

Elgar/Carter: Cello Concertos (Decca)

'Tonally burnished, technically startling, ripely emotional – it's been years since a new recording of Elgar's great concerto made this kind of visceral impact. The Carter is commandingly astringent: a magnificent concerto debut from the young American.'

Tabea Zimmermann (viola) Deutsches Symphonie-Orchester Berlin/Hans Graf Hindemith: Complete Viola Works (Myrios)

'Hindemith has found a superb advocate in Tabea Zimmermann. Her gorgeously woody tone and intelligent, characterful playing are ideal in this fascinating programme.'

CHAMBER NOMINEES

Quatuor Ebène

Felix & Fanny Mendelssohn – Quartets (ERATO)

'The impassioned playing of the Ebène Quartet bring the works of the Mendelssohn siblings leaping off the page to intense effect. Felix's late masterpiece benefits as much as Fanny's neglected but remarkable quartet does from their compelling advocacy.'

Augustin Dumay (violin) & Louis Lortie (piano)

Franck & Strauss Violin Sonatas (Onyx)

'Two great artists at the height of their powers, perfectly balanced, their gentle, unforced approach producing a sound of exquisite allure... feline grace and slow-burning passion.'

Paolo Pandolfo, Amelie Chemin (viola da gamba), Thomas Boysen (theorbo and Baroque guitar), Markus Hüninger (harpsichord)

Couperin – Pièces de Viole (Glossa)

'Pandolfo is master of creating richly decorated music from Couperin's skeletal scores. Barely a note lacks nuance of bowing or an ornamental figure, yet never at the expense of purposefully flowing lines. A superbly recorded disc.'

VOCAL NOMINATIONS

Matthias Goerne (baritone), Thomas Larcher, Ensemble Resonanz (piano)

Eisler: Ernste Gesänge & other Lieder etc (Harmonia Mundi)

'This disc is a revelation, with an astonishing range of texture and style. Goerne is sensitive to every expressive nuance of the Austrian's most intimate writing.'

Jonas Kaufman (tenor), Orchester der Deutschen Oper Berlin/Donald Runnicles

Wagner: from Lohengrin, Die Walkure, Tannhauser; Wesendonck Lieder (Decca)

'No other Heldentenor can touch Kaufman in this repertoire: radiance, refinement and expressive eloquence mark out these magnificent performances of narrations and lieder.'

Christopher Purves (baritone) Arcangelo, Jonathan Cohen Handel's Finest Arias for Base Voice (Hyperion)

'As villainous king, emperor in love, to a god falling asleep, Purves demonstrates remarkable dramatic versatility and superb vocal facility in every one of his 15 roles.'

CHORAL NOMINATIONS

Gabrieli Consort & Players; Wroclaw Phil. Choir, New College trebles, John-Mark Ainsley, Christopher Maltman, Susan Gritton/Paul McCreesh

Britten: War Requiem (Winged Lion/Signum)

'Intensely focused singing (glinting with young voices), a dramatically persuasive performance, and a gloriously immersive recording. Profoundly moving.'

Estonian Philharmonic Choir, Latvian Radio Choir & Vox Clamantis/ Tonu Kaljuste

Pärt: Adam's Lament (ECM)

'Lovingly overseen by the composer himself, these luminous recordings are rich in atmosphere, emotional intensity and textures you can reach out and touch.'

Sabina Cvilak, Chorus & Orchestra of Teatro Regio Torino/Gianandrea Noseda Petrassi: Magnificat; Salmo IX (Chandos)

'This outstanding recording, masterminded by Knussen, makes a compelling new case for neglected opera. Each voice delivers a searing, indelible performance, captured live.'

Alan Oke, Giselle Allen, David Kempster, Catherine Wyn-Rogers etc, Chorus of Opera North, Guildhall School of Music, Britten-Pears Orchestra /Steuart Bedford

Britten: Peter Grimes (Signum)
